Guest Speaker Lawrence B. Gibbs, Esq.

Lawrence B. Gibbs, Esq. is a member of the law firm of Miller & Chevalier in Washington, D.C. He served as Commissioner of the IRS in Washington, D.C. from August 1986 to March 1989, and was a recipient of the Treasury's Alexander Hamilton Award and the Tax Executives Institute's Distinguished Service Award. Mr. Gibbs is presently a member of the Tax Foundation Policy Committee, the American Tax Policy Institute Board, the American College of Tax Counsel, the American College of Trust and Estate Counsel. the American Law Institute, and the Committees on Government Relations, Formulation of Tax Policy, Administrative Practice, and Corporate Tax of the Taxation Section of the American Bar Association. He is a Trustee of the Southern Federal Tax Institute and a member of the Advisory Board of Tax Management. Mr. Gibbs received a B.A. from Yale University in 1960 and graduated from the University of Texas School of Law in 1963.

Thomas J. Brorby is a shareholder in the law firm of Brorby, Crozier & Dobie, P.C., in Austin, Texas. He received his LL.B. from the University of Texas and his LL.M. (in taxation) from New York University.

Mr. Brorby is past chairman of the Exempt Organizations Committee of the Tax Section of the ABA. He is also past chairman of the Tax Lawyers-IRS Liaison Committee for the Southwest Region, past chairman of the Tax Section of the State Bar of Texas, and is a Fellow of the American College of Tax Counsel.

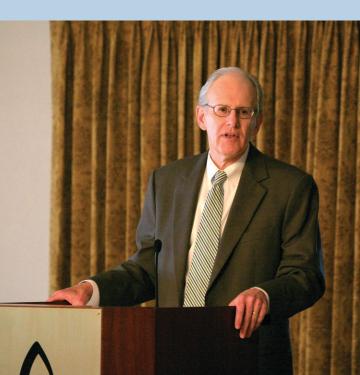
